RESEARCH INTERESTS

To better understand mechanisms generating disparities in chronic disease among older U.S. adults. This work focuses on how exposure to chronic stressors rooted in social and structural inequities over the life course (e.g., ageism, discrimination, race and gender ideologies, adverse life events) influence contextual, psychosocial, biological, and behavioral determinants of health. Emphasis on the health implications of ageism, Black-White health disparities, and cardiometabolic health outcomes. The underlying motivation for this work is to inform innovative community, societal, and policy level change to promote health and reduce chronic disease burden and disparities within the older U.S. adult population.
